


## Director's Statement



George and Kojo's poignant story in the film is a reflection of these cultural intersections. While George's anguish is palpable, Kojo, with the heart of George's son, emerges as a symbol of hope, a bridge between two worlds, two cultures, and two histories.

In creating *i & we, UBUNTU*, as well as my former films *Universal Hug* (Oct. 2022), *Life in the Little* (Nov. 2022), *Struggle* (Dec. 2022), *Double* **Jeopardy** (May 2023), I aim to foreground values that resonate with intercultural awareness that stands out as a beacon, teaching us to see the 'other' not as an outsider but as an integral part of our shared humanity. Reconciliation and self-forgiveness are deeply African yet universal in their appeal, urging us to mend what's broken, both within and outside. The narrative also delves into the subjects of faith and hope, vital to navigating the challenges of modern life, especially in a metropolis like LA.
